For children aged 3-7 years

She told him not to worry. She was kind and made him feel better. Her name was Nancy and she told Jay she was a social worker.







Nancy said that she was there to make sure Jay was safe and that everything would be okay.

He didn't like the shouting at home and sometimes he was hungry and very cold. Your story will be different to Jay's but Nancy said all children need to be safe and healthy and happy.

Nancy told Jay he was going to stay with some nice people called foster carers. Then she gave him a backpack with games and colouring pencils in it. He liked it. They got into her car.



Nancy told Jay it was her job to make sure all children are looked after well and that she was there to help him and to help his family.

She said that sometimes children need to stay with someone from Brighter Futures for Children until things were better at home.



Jay was still a bit sad but she talked to him a lot and even made him smile. He liked her.



Before they got to the house, Nancy showed Jay a picture of the foster carers and read out the words about them.
They were called Nene and Yassi. They looked kind.



There was a picture of the bedroom Jay would stay in and another one of their cat. He was called George and he looked like he was grinning.



Jay felt better and wanted to see his room.

Nene and Yassi opened the door and said hello to Jay. Nene took him to see his room and Yassi talked to Nancy.

Jay liked his room. It had a nice bed and a little chair and a desk. There were toys for him to play with and a teddy bear. Then they went downstairs and sat down with Nancy.



Nancy said she was going but would come to see Jay the next day.

She gave him a little card with her name on it and her number. She had drawn a smiley face on it, just for him.







Nene and Yassi showed Jay the kitchen and gave him a drink. It was nice. They asked him if he was hungry. He was but he was worried if they would cook him something he didn't like.

They sat at the table and they asked Jay what foods he liked. He told them and Nene wrote them down. Yassi made him some of the food he said he liked. It was nice.

Nene said they would get some of the other foods tomorrow and she and Yassi both said they would do their best to cook foods he liked.

They tucked him in and Nene read him a story. She stayed with him, holding his hand until he fell asleep.







The clothes were very nice and Jay felt warm and clean and happy.

Nene let Jay have a friend from school over for tea. That was fun. He liked the food Nene cooked and his friend told Jay he was lucky. Jay thought so too.

Sometimes Jay missed his mum but Nancy made sure he saw her and told him what his mum was doing to try to make things better.

Your story won't be the same as his but what is the same is that you will have lovely foster carers who will look after you and you will have your own social worker, although they may not be called Nancy!
